Rio Vista Park Opens With a Splash

Rio Vista Park – Peoria’s first community park – opened March 6, 2004 with a tremendous show of support from the community. Hundreds turned out to experience the city’s latest and greatest recreation destination, celebrating along with dozens of city staff and others who helped make the park a reality.


“We are very excited about opening this fabulous park facility for our residents,” said J. P. de la Montaigne, Peoria Community Services Director. “The skate park, picnic area, splash park, playground, fields and courts are all first class.”

Rio Vista was designed with the assistance of the community to make sure that the park offers something for everyone to enjoy. Rio Vista Community Park received its name from a resident inspired by its location adjacent to New River with the confluence of Skunk Creek.

Phase I of the park covers about 35 acres of the total 50-acre park site. This phase includes four lighted softball and multi-use fields with restroom and concession building, a group picnic area for groups up to 300, and a 28,000 square foot skate park

available for skateboarders and roller-bladers. The park also features lighted sand volleyball courts, two playgrounds, and an interactive water play area to help keep folks cool during the summer months.

Perhaps the most visually striking feature of the park is its entry bridge, which brings visitors over part of the 2.5-acre lake. In addition to providing irrigation water to the facility, the lake will be stocked with trout, catfish, bass, and sunfish during various times of the year through the State of Arizona Game & Fish Department’s urban fishing program. (Anglers age 14 and over must purchase a \$16 Class U (urban fishing) license to fish in the lake.)

“Game and Fish tested the lake water quality, which scored a 43 out of a possible 44 points – they gave us an A+ rating,” said Kirk Haines, Peoria Parks Manager.

Design of Phase II of the park will begin this summer, and will likely include additional lighted youth sports fields, walking paths, additional parking, and a 350-foot pedestrian bridge spanning New River to connect residents on the west side of the river to Rio Vista. Future additions to Rio Vista may also include a recreation center with gymnasium space and classrooms for recreation and community programs.

In celebration of Rio Vista’s opening, a number of events and activities are planned for the month of March and April including an in-line skating demonstration, sand volleyball tournament, family fishing clinic, skateboard exhibition and a movie in the park.

Peoria’s early history dates back to the late 1800’s when William J. Murphy drove the completion of the Arizona Canal in 1885 ultimately playing a vital part in taming the desert. He quickly realized the importance of recruiting settlers to help turn the desert lands into productive farmland and soon convinced four families from Peoria, Illinois to move here and start “growing” Peoria.

In 1954 the Peoria was incorporated and officially became a town. To recognize its 50th year of incorporation,

CITY COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

October

- Publicly thanked the six city employees who serve in the national guard and reserves and were recently called to active duty: police officers Allen Young (U.S. Air Force), David Foulke (U.S. Air Force), Jeffrey Carpenter (U.S. Marine Corps), and Keith Christie (U.S. Army); firefighter Steve Hanson (U.S. Air Force); and utility technician Ron Roat (U.S. Air Force).
- Approved an agreement with the Central Arizona Water Conservation District (CAWCD) for the purchase of 15 percent ownership capacity in the Agua Fria Recharge Project. This capacity will give the city the ability to recharge a portion of its Central Arizona Project (CAP) water allocation in exchange for groundwater credits that allow pumping from various wells around the city.

November

- Approved the purchase of 60 acres of property south of the southeast corner of 83rd and Olive Avenues for future development of a community park. Funding for design and construction of the park is scheduled in the 2006-2008 time frame.
- Accepted a report on the city's implementation of Stage One: Water Watch under the drought contingency plan. Stage One requires a 5% reduction in water use by the City, and requests a voluntary reduction of 5% from the community. Through aggressive water saving programs in city parks, rights of way and elsewhere, the City has far exceeded the goal, reducing water use by 20%.

December

- Reduced water utility rates by 5%. Improved city bond ratings and concerted efforts to reduce operation and maintenance costs within the Utilities Department have resulted in decreased costs to operate the city's water utility, making the rate reduction possible.
- Recognized the Community Services Department and its staff. The department is one of five national recipients of the 2003 Excellence in Youth Sports award, and its adaptive recreation program was awarded the 2003 Outstanding Parks and Recreation Department by Special Olympics Arizona.

January

- Confirmed the City Manager's appointment of Mary Jo Kief as Peoria City Clerk. Kief replaced Jan Graziano, who retired after nearly 20 years of service to the city.
- Annexed approximately five and a half square miles in two separate areas to enhance the city's ability to provide services and infrastructure improvements as well as ensure development in these areas is compatible with the city's voter-approved General Plan.
- Approved the donation of two surplus fire engines: one to the Peoria Unified School District; and one to the Glendale Community College District. The engines will be utilized as training platforms for high school cadets and college fire science students.

February

- Authorized, for the second consecutive year, a \$25,000 expenditure as Peoria's share of a lobbying contract focused on preserving land around Luke Air Force Base and representing the West Valley during the 2005 federal Base Realignment and Closure process.
- Approved a \$537,000 construction contract for the expansion and improvement of Braewood Park. Improvements include new access and parking, a lighted walking path, and new picnic shelters.
- Approved a \$278,000 annual contract for landscape maintenance services in city rights-of-way, fire stations, and public utilities areas. The city staff previously assigned to right-of-way maintenance has been reassigned to city parks, including the new Rio Vista Community park.

Mayor's Report

2004 marks the City of Peoria's 50th year of incorporation. As a community, we'll spend time throughout the year reflecting on our history – all the way back to the work of the city's founders in the late 1800's. I'd like to take this opportunity, however, to reflect on our more recent accomplishments and our expectations for the future.

2003 was a year of progress, recognition, and work on important issues ranging from the Council-approved memorandum of understanding with Theater Works and accepting numerous awards for Peoria's exceptional programs to proactively addressing the preservation of Luke Air Force Base.

On April 1, 2003 the Peoria City Council voted unanimously to lead a regional effort in support of Luke Air Force Base. Through these efforts, and with the support of our congressional delegation, over \$27 million has been appropriated to address the safety and property equity issues around the base. Since Luke AFB is the largest single-site employer in Arizona, and with the Department of Defense looking at closing a quarter of the military bases around the country in the coming years, this appropriation is especially important to our community. In 2004, we will continue to take a leadership role in protecting this vital component to our nation's defense and our community's economy as the base closure program proceeds.

The City of Peoria was honored with the 2003 "Crescordia" award for environmental education at Valley Forward's annual environmental excellence awards. The city earned this award for its efforts in water conservation, specifically those focused on education and communication. These efforts include free water-conservation classes, community events, advertising, local movie theater slides, a web site, and a new xeriscape and hot water re-circulator rebate program. These programs have been very popular with the community, and will grow even stronger in 2004.

In 2003, the Peoria Police Department earned re-accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies. The department was the first law enforcement agency in the West Valley to earn such accreditation, becoming the 442nd internationally accredited law enforcement agency in July 1997. Re-accreditation is a testimony to the dedication of every member of the Peoria Police Department.

The City of Peoria's Adaptive Recreation Program was awarded the 2003 Outstanding Parks and Recreation Department by Special Olympics Arizona. Peoria's program was recognized as an elite program throughout Maricopa County at the Special Olympics Arizona Leadership Conference. Peoria is one of five national recipients of the 2003 Excellence in Youth Sports Award, and this and the many other first-rate recreation programs offered by the city hope to serve even more people in 2004.

Even as we celebrate our history, there's no time to stand still. As I write this column, the community is celebrating the opening of Rio Vista Park, Peoria's first community park. In the years to come, its 50 acres are sure to be an important focal point for the community, bringing people together for softball, soccer, skateboarding, picnicking or fishing on its well-stocked lake.

As Peoria has grown, so has the need for additional public safety services. 2004 kicked-off with the public dedication of the Public Safety Administration Building, home to the police department and fire department administrative offices. In 2004, we will also open two new fire stations to replace existing and worn-out stations.

Looking back, we see how much has been accomplished, and looking forward, we see how much is left to do. 2003 was a great year, but 2004 should be even better.

Owners of "go-ped" scooters or other motorized play vehicles (MPV), must become familiar with City Ordinance 01-172. For example, MPVs are not to be operated between sunset and 8 a.m., and they cannot be operated on sidewalks, or on city streets that have four or more lanes or a posted speed limit greater than 30 miles per hour. Land Purchases Solidify Park Plans

The Peoria City Council recently approved the purchase of 60 acres of property near the southeast corner of 83rd and Olive Avenues for a community park. The \$3.4 million purchase will provide the city with a park site that is convenient for the public and brings recreational amenities to an area of the city that is currently under-served.


"This site is ideal for the community's needs in this area of the city," said J.P. de la Montaigne, Peoria's Director of Community Services. "The park will include play fields and other recreation amenities for everyone."

The exact layout and features of the park will be designed through a process that will include public meetings in order to make sure the people who will use the park have a voice in the kinds of things they'll be able to do there. These public meetings will be scheduled in the future.

"We're still four or five years away from opening a park at this site, but open spaces are becoming more and more scarce, so securing a park site in south Peoria was a priority for the City Council," said de la Montaigne.

Farther north, plans to develop a neighborhood park for the Terramar area have undergone some changes. In planning improvements to the original Terramar Park site at 73rd Drive & Briles Road, it was discovered that the developer (who had dedicated the land for a park to the city) had previously entered into an agreement with the Corps of Engineers to preserve the park site as a cultural resource. It was then that city officials learned about very significant Native American ruins at this park site. The city decided to preserve the cultural aspects of the site (now called the Palo Verde Open Space), and search for a new site for a traditional neighborhood park.

After consulting area residents, the city purchased a new 5-acre site for Terramar Park at the 68th Lane alignment,



north of Happy Valley Road on the north side of Terramar Elementary School. The city is also moving forward with plans at the Palo Verde Open Space parcel to allow for some recreation activity there. A protective layer, called "capping," will be laid over the existing area to preserve any underground artifacts that may exist while allowing for some recreational use of a portion of the site. A preliminary plan has been sent to the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) for review. Once a decision is received by SHPO, the analysis and design process for the potential site improvements to the Palo Verde Open Space will begin.

The city would appreciate any assistance Terramar residents can offer in helping keep the Palo Verde Open Space secure from looting, vandalism, and non-motorized activities within the site. State and Federal law protect the cultural remains. Digging or operating motorized vehicles of any sort is prohibited in the area - neighbors are asked to report any suspicious activity to the Peoria Police Department immediately by dialing 612-773-8311.

Police and Fire Departments Move Into New Home

Peoria's Police and Fire Departments opened a brand new home in January 2004. The 94,000 square-foot facility, known as the Public Safety Administration Building is home to the Police Department headquarters, Fire Department administrative offices, and Peoria's Channel 11 cable television studio and offices. At 94,000 square-feet, it is the largest city office facility ever built, designed to serve the city's needs in these areas for the next 20 years. The benefits are not just space, but improvements for the city's internal and external customers.

Access to the former police headquarters was difficult, and parking was relatively far away. The new building features its own access road (Cinnabar Avenue) directly from 83rd Avenue, with ample public parking immediately in front of the entrance. Once in the building, an information desk (staffed 24-hours a day) welcome visitors and assists them in finding their final destination. From a customer service standpoint, it is leaps and bounds ahead of the previous facility.

It is a great operational improvement as well. The 230 city staff members - police officers, support personnel, and Fire and Police Department command staff - who have moved in appreciate the comfortable and open work areas. The building also features a public meeting room and large training room that doubles as the city's Emergency Operations Center (which is set up only when needed). The Fire Department

administrative staff had been scattered around a collection of old or temporary facilities. In the PSAB, they work side by side, which improves workflow and efficiency.

Additionally, the Police Department is very happy to have its own state-of-the-art indoor shooting range adjacent to the building. Previously, officers had to travel to north Glendale or Phoenix to maintain firearms proficiency. Having a local range eliminates the long transit times that came with using other facilities, which means police officers spend more time patrolling Peoria's streets. The facility also features a simulator to train police officers for different situations they may encounter on patrol. The overall effect of this improved training environment is better service for Peoria residents.

Protect Yourself From Car Thefts and Burglaries

Did you know that last year in the City of Peoria approximately 1,085 vehicles were burglarized and 1,147 vehicles were stolen? Like most other cities, vehicles are prime targets for crimes of opportunity.

There are things you can do that make a big difference. The more layers of protection you employ, the tougher your car is to steal or burglarize.

Bad guys look for easy targets, make sure your car isn't one of them! Here are some tips the Peoria Police Department recommends in order to make your vehicle a tougher target.

Layer 1 - Common Sense Tips

- Lock your car and completely close your windows—half of all vehicles stolen are left unlocked.
- Take your keys with you...do not leave your car running (even for a minute) while at convenience stores, gas stations or at ATM's—these locations are common hunting grounds for thieves. Nearly 20% of vehicles stolen have the keys in them.
- Do not hide a spare key in the car-car thieves know where to look.
- Do not leave items in plain sight as this only encourages thieves to break windows or locks to obtain them.
- If you have a garage, use it! If not, park in a well lit area (bad guys prefer to work in the dark).



How safe is your car? By following a few simple guidelines, you can make your vehicle much less likely to be a target for car thieves and burglars.

Layer 2 - Visible/Audible Deterrents

- Audible alarms
- Steering wheel locks, steering column collars, wheel and tire locks
- Window etching-etch vehicle identification number (VIN) on all car windows (Peoria PD can do this for you for free!)
- Theft deterrent decals-such as the Arizona Automobile Theft Authority's "Watch Your Car" program (www.azwatchyourcar.com)

Layer 3 - Vehicle immobilizers prevent thieves from bypassing your ignition and "hot-wiring" your vehicle

- Fuse cut-offs, kill switches, starter, ignition and fuel disablers
- High security locks and keys

ROAD CONSTRUCTION UPDATE



Lake Pleasant Parkway

Phase 2 of the Lake Pleasant Parkway (which will continue the parkway from 95th Avenue west to Williams Road) has been designed. The construction schedule is on hold pending acquisition of the necessary rights-of-way.

Thunderbird Road Reconstruction

The Thunderbird Road Rehabilitation project will reconstruct the roadway between the New River bridge and Loop 101. This section of roadway will be finished with rubberized asphalt. The project is currently in the design phase – construction is expected to begin this summer, the estimated completion is fall 2004.

83rd Avenue & Union Hills Intersection Improvements

These improvements include: one additional through-lane on the north side of Union Hills Drive from the Loop 101 to 84th Avenue; a dedicated right-turn lane from Union Hills onto a dedicated lane on northbound 83rd Avenue (not subject to the intersection traffic signal); and one additional through-lane on the south side of Union Hills from 84th Avenue to 83rd Avenue. Construction is estimated to begin in fall 2004, with completion targeted for summer 2005.
