City Council Highlights

December :::

- Approved an agreement with the state for the widening of Olive Avenue at the Loop 101 interchange. Net cost to the city for its portion of the project is estimated to be about \$290,000.
- Awarded a \$213,000 contract to improve the Butler Drive median and stripe a turn lane on Butler Drive at 87th Avenue.
- Authorized construction of a second access road to Liberty High School, a temporary roadway along the 95th Avenue alignment from Speckled Gecko Drive north to Pinnacle Peak Road.

January :::

- Selected Councilmember Ron Aames of the Palo Verde District to serve as vice mayor from Jan. 6, 2010, to Jan. 5, 2011, and Councilmember Carlo Leone of the Pine District to serve as mayor pro tem.
- Awarded a \$940,000 contract for study and design of the 112th Avenue Truck Road Reliever from Rose Garden Lane to Pinnacle Peak Road and 107th Avenue intersection.
- Awarded a \$500,000 contract to rebuild Deer Valley Road between 83rd Avenue and Hillcrest Boulevard.
- Adopted a mid-year budget amendment trimming about \$1.2 million from the Fiscal Year 2010 budget. Most of the savings will come by cutting 16 vacant staff positions. No filled positions will be impacted by the action.

February :::

- Accepted a \$1.3 million U.S. Department of Energy grant that will fund energy conservation projects such as installing efficient LED lighting in city facilities, parks and streets and a pilot wind turbine at the Lake Pleasant fire station.
- Awarded a \$45,000 contract to purchase and install two wind turbines at the Lake Pleasant fire station which are expected to provide up to 50% of the power needed at the facility.
- Awarded a \$4.2 million contract to widen 83rd Avenue from Williams Road to Calle Lejos to a five-lane roadway plus bike lanes; the project will also improve the 83rd Avenue intersection at Pinnacle Peak Road and install drainage improvements.

Mayor's Report



This issue of Peoria Focus should arrive in your mailbox around the same time the first pitch of Spring Training 2010 arrives in a catcher's mitt at your Peoria Sports Complex.

Spring Training generates \$725,000 annually in sales-tax revenue for the city, a majority of which helps fund police and fire; parks and recreation; adult and children's programs; the library; and virtually everything else the city does for its residents.

I appreciate the effort many of you made to do your holiday shopping in Peoria, and now isn't the time to stop. The holidays are past and we're starting a new year, but the economy remains the same.

Yet Spring Training continues to grow in Arizona. The Cactus League will comprise 15 teams as the Cincinnati Reds join the Cleveland Indians in Goodyear. There will be nine teams playing at five locations in the West Valley alone.

I'm asking you to support the proverbial home team by centering your Spring Training activities in and around the Peoria Sports Complex. Here's why:


- The aforementioned importance of sales-tax revenue to municipal services.
- It also supports Peoria youth leagues via the Diamond Club, which provides more than 650 volunteers who serve as ushers, ticket takers, parking-lot attendants, concession workers, program vendors and in other roles. The group holds an annual charity game between our two "home" teams, the San Diego Padres and Seattle Mariners, to raise money for local youth programs.
- If you follow a Cactus League team other than the Mariners or Padres, it will visit Peoria twice – so see it play here.
- Unlike newer West Valley facilities that are surrounded by fields of dreams, the Peoria Sports Complex sits amid the city's entertainment and retail district. Dozens of restaurants and bars are just steps away, as are massages, merchandise and movies.

The complex will host 29 home games this year. Single-game ticket prices range from \$6 to \$23. To see the complete 2010 schedule of games and promotions, visit www.peoriaaz.gov/springtraining.



Here Comes the Sun

March 13 Fair Offers One-Stop Solar Shop for Residents



A new solar array at the Beardsley Water Reclamation Facility produces about a quarter of the energy used by the plant's operations building.

Peoria property owners open to installing solar panels at their homes or businesses can get the information necessary to do their own cost/benefit analyses at a Saturday morning solar fair March 13 at the Beardsley Water Reclamation Facility, located on 111th Avenue south of Beardsley Road.

The solar fair, from 10 a.m. to noon at 19980 N. 111th Ave., will coincide with the dedication of the wastewater-treatment facility's own solar-panel pilot project, which is expected to produce about a quarter of the energy used by the plant's operations building.


City officials have designed the event to be a one-stop shop that will answer questions about the cost and construction of solar panels at a home or business.

A number of solar-installation companies will be on hand to make customized estimates based upon individual needs — up-front costs, projected annual savings and applicable federal, state and utility incentives. City building officials will be on site to answer questions about permits, inspections and fees.

"We want people to be able to decide if it's something that can work for them," says event organizer Claudia Christo, an engineer with Peoria's Public Works/Utilities Department. "Prices are coming down, so solar energy is becoming more affordable for the average homeowner."

The Beardsley facility's new solar array comprises 266 panels, each approximately 3 feet by 5 feet and manufactured in Arizona.

Peoria paid for the pilot project with federal stimulus dollars in partnership with the state Water Infrastructure Finance Authority. The project also qualified for APS incentives totaling approximately \$280,000.



Peoria Is Counting On You This Spring

Census Population Survey Means More Money for Community Programs, Services



When most of us receive unsolicited mail, it usually ends up in the trash bin. That is precisely the reason why Peoria is putting a large effort to ensure that its residents don't do just that with their 2010 Census questionnaire.

The 2010 Census is a count of everyone living in the United States and is mandated by the Constitution. Census data are used to distribute congressional seats to states, to distribute more than \$435 billion in federal funds to local, state and tribal governments each year, and to make decisions about what community services to provide.

That means more than \$1,500 a year per Peoria resident. The 2010

Census questionnaire will be one of the shortest in history, taking about 10 minutes to complete. Strict laws protect the confidentiality of respondents and the information they provide.

Because funding is distributed to cities and towns based upon population, when you complete your Census 2010 questionnaire you ensure that thousands of your tax dollars are returned to your community in critical services for you and your family. These services can range from safety and health programs to parks and transportation facilities programs that improve your life. Your answers alone can mean the difference of thousands of dollars to your community over the next 10 years. Multiply that by your neighbors' responses, and that means millions in these tough times.

These funds come back to your community in the form of services, including:

- Police and fire protection
- Hospitals
- Schools, parks and libraries
- Senior centers
- Roads and neighborhood improvements
- Local bus service

You'll receive the census questionnaire in March or April. Just fill out the 10 questions and mail it back. It's easy and confidential. It should only take about 10 minutes to complete the form. The 2010 Census questionnaire is one of the shortest and easiest since the nation's first census in 1790.

Getting an accurate count is so important that participation is required by law. If you don't return the questionnaire, a Census representative will contact you by phone or visit your home as many as six times seeking your answers. If you still don't respond, your neighbors may be asked about the people residing in your home.

The Census form is completely confidential. Personal Census information is not shared with any other agency or organization. There are no exceptions. Census workers can go to jail for revealing census information.

So this spring, when you receive your Census form, be sure to complete and mail it immediately. The future of Peoria services is in your hands.

Cotton Crossing is now a finished road, rather than just a name! Just before Christmas the new roadway between Olive Avenue and Grand Avenue was opened to traffic. A roundabout manages traffic near the city complex, at Cinnabar Avenue. Another roundabout is located at the intersection of the new portion of 79th Avenue and Whitney Drive. Try out the new pedestrian path, lined with fitness equipment, between 83rd and 79th avenues. The intersection of Cotton Crossing at Grand Avenue, permitting access to the Peoria Walmart area, will be completed this spring. At that time vehicles will be able to travel from Grand Avenue to Olive Avenue on a four-lane road without stop signs.

Sidewalks were constructed recently on Lake Pleasant Parkway between 87th and 91st avenues. Prior to this project, the sidewalk on the south side of the road terminated at 87th Avenue. New Road Offers Relief from Liberty Traffic Congestion

The Peoria City Council voted unanimously Dec. 1 to build a secondary access to Liberty High School. The city will construct a temporary roadway along the 95th Avenue alignment from Speckled Gecko Drive north to Pinnacle Peak Road.

"I am extremely happy that we are able to provide a solution to address the concerns of parents and residents" said Councilmember Cathy Carlat, who represents the Mesquite District in which the high school is located. "The city worked hard with the developer and the school district to make sure we came up with a plan that pleases everyone."

After the first week of school, many parents and residents voiced concerns about congestion along Deer Valley Road at 97th Avenue during the morning drop-off and afternoon pick-up times.

The developer, Community Southwest, has long-term plans to build 95th Avenue and an additional traffic light along Deer Valley Road. Those plans have been postponed

due to the slumping housing market. The developer will work immediately with the State Land Department to acquire the right-of-way.

Once the land is acquired, Peoria will begin construction of the \$631,000 roadway that is scheduled to be complete by August 2010, in time for the next school year.

City to Open New Road, Intersection in Mid-April

Motorists near downtown Peoria can look forward to a new shortcut across Grand Avenue. City officials are eyeing a mid-April opening for Cotton Crossing, a new road that curves northeast from the intersection of 83rd Avenue and Mountain View Road, crosses Grand with a new traffic signal and continues on to Peoria Avenue by Walmart.

In late November, officials opened a realigned portion of 83rd Avenue between Monroe Street and Mountain View Drive, adjacent to the east side of the Peoria Municipal Campus. That segment includes a roundabout at 83rd and Cinnabar avenues. The construction of Cotton Crossing and realignment of 83rd Avenue literally pave the way for

Peoria Place, a multiuse residential, office and retail development planned for 127 acres between 83rd and Grand avenues.

Eight of Every 10 Residents Say Peoria's Quality of Life is Excellent or Good

About eight of every 10 city residents say Peoria's overall quality of life is "excellent" or "good", according to a citizen-satisfaction survey conducted in December 2009. The National Citizen Survey mailed questionnaires to a random sample of 1,200 Peoria households and received 324 replies. The data collected helps the city prioritize services; allocate financial and other resources; and develop programs and policies. Among Peoria's characteristics rated most highly by residents were recreational opportunities and the quality of new development in the city. Survey respondents who interacted with city employees gave high marks on customer service, and most are satisfied with the city's overall direction. "We've also built in an educational component and some fun activities that we hope will energize our residents to incorporate sustainability into their lifestyles, which would be a win-win scenario for them and for Peoria."

Those interested in biking to the event can utilize the new Skunk Creek-New River connection under Loop 101 and 83rd Avenue – or can follow the New River Trail from Bell Road to the north or Thunderbird Road to the south. ReCycle the River, a 6-mile bike ride, also will be part of the day's activities.



Beardsley Connection to Loop 101 Will Ease Traffic in 83rd/Union Hills Area



Road construction teams contracted by the Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) have started building the Beardsley Connection to Loop 101, a \$30 million project designed to ease traffic around the Loop 101 interchanges at Union Hills Drive and 75th Avenue. Officials expect the work to take almost two years, though major elements may open to traffic sooner.



Beardsley Connection to Loop 101 Anticipated Milestones

The project is scheduled to be completed in late 2011, with major elements of the project open to traffic between late 2010 and mid-2011.

Fall 2010

- Widening of Union Hills Drive complete.

Winter 2010

- Opening of the southbound off-ramp at Beardsley Road.
- Opening of the combined southbound on-ramp at 75th Avenue/Beardsley Road.

Spring 2011

- Opening of the new combined Union Hills Drive/Beardsley Road southbound off-ramp.

Summer 2011

- Opening of the new Beardsley Road u-turn northbound/eastbound on-ramp.

Advance notification of restrictions and closures will be provided through message boards along the freeway and on arterial streets prior to lane restrictions and closures, regular email alerts to subscribers of ADOT's Loop 101 (Agua Fria Freeway) mailing list and on the Loop 101 Closures and Restrictions section of the ADOT Web site at www.ValleyFreeways.com.
